The 1st quarter has ended and we have one more week of the Middle School trimester schedule. When the quarter ended, we sent out report cards for all students with a form for parents to request printed report cards in the future. Many have chosen to have hard copies of the report cards sent, and were grateful for the option. Students, and teachers, are busy preparing and transitioning for the busy winter months.

Recently, students have participated in a field trip to the Isabella Stewart Gardner Art Museum; travelled off campus and worked with Fish & Game to learn about water quality testing; and participated in various off campus physical education classes at Evergreen and WMS.

Students are working on project based learning in Quantitative Reasoning, English and Physical Science, to name a few.

The entire eighth grade class will travel to see Midway the movie this Friday. They have been participating every Friday for the last three weeks in activities surrounding their WWII unit of study. WMRHS JROTC visited for a day to show the students what it meant to be a participant in the military; several community members from around the region have been speakers relaying their first hand experience of the time and students have seen in action the lifestyle and thoughts of the times.

We recently awarded the October "Student of the Month" to one student in the middle school and one in high school. Both were given a \$25 gift certificate to the Little Village Bookstore in Littleton. They were chosen on the merits of their actions of respect for others and community engagement. Each month a Student of the Month will be awarded to students who promote our Profile values and exemplify respect, communication, trust, curiosity, creativity, compassion, and achievement through contributions to the classroom, extracurricular activities, and/or the Profile community at large.

The Music/Drama club's participation in the Franconia Haunted Walk was a success. They chose to theme their walk after 'Where the Wild Things Are'. The members dressed as wild animals and staged themselves in the woods as either scary animals or playful and mischievous animals. Several young children delighted in the walk, by going through more than once.

Our Quiz Bowl team has been extremely busy these past months, they have participated in quiz bowls in Plymouth, the Lafayette trivia night and finally last weekend at the Granite State Challenge.

On our most recent early release day, Dawn Glidden and Lori Innes provided a timeline and guidelines for our self-reflection report. All staff are actively involved in gathering evidence for the numerous indicators that we need to report out to NEAS&C. At our next early release day and faculty meeting, we will analyze the data to see if we need to gather more evidence- or are lacking the evidence for the indicators. We will spend the time reflecting on the information to initiate writing our Student Learning, Learning Resources and Learning Support reports.

The evolution of Flex block continues, we have discovered places we can improve and create enrichment activities. We are refining a schedule to help provide students with not only interventions and remediation, but also opportunities to personalize their learning.

At our past Faculty meeting, the SAU Director of Student services presented a slideshow on 'Accommodations and Modifications'. This has brought to light many rich discussions in how we are best providing support for our IEP students and 504 students, as well as best practices for all. We are also working in conjunction with Jennifer about creating a family advisory group for special education.
